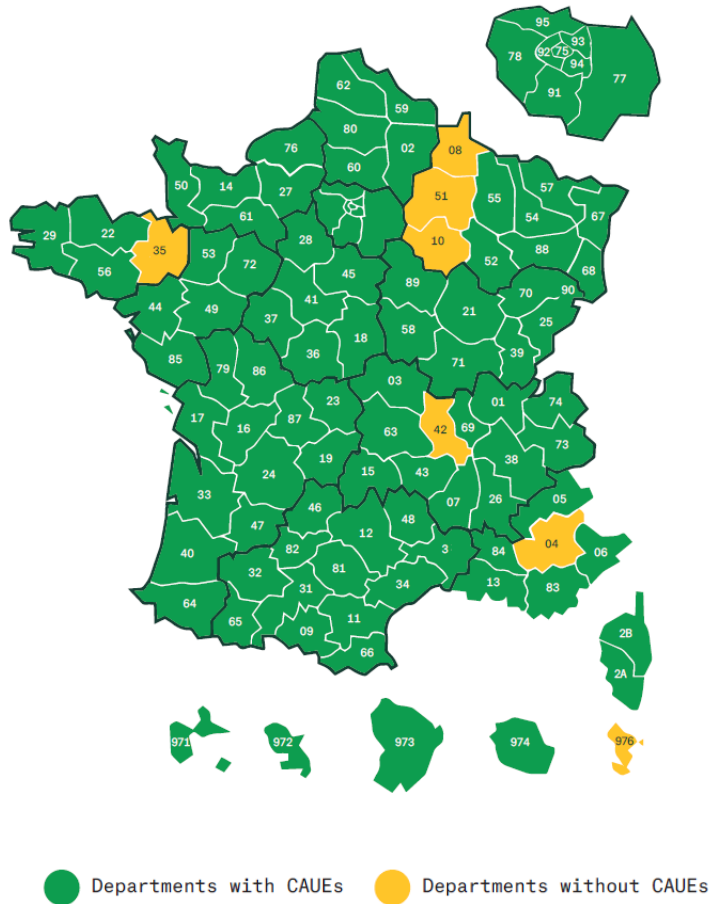

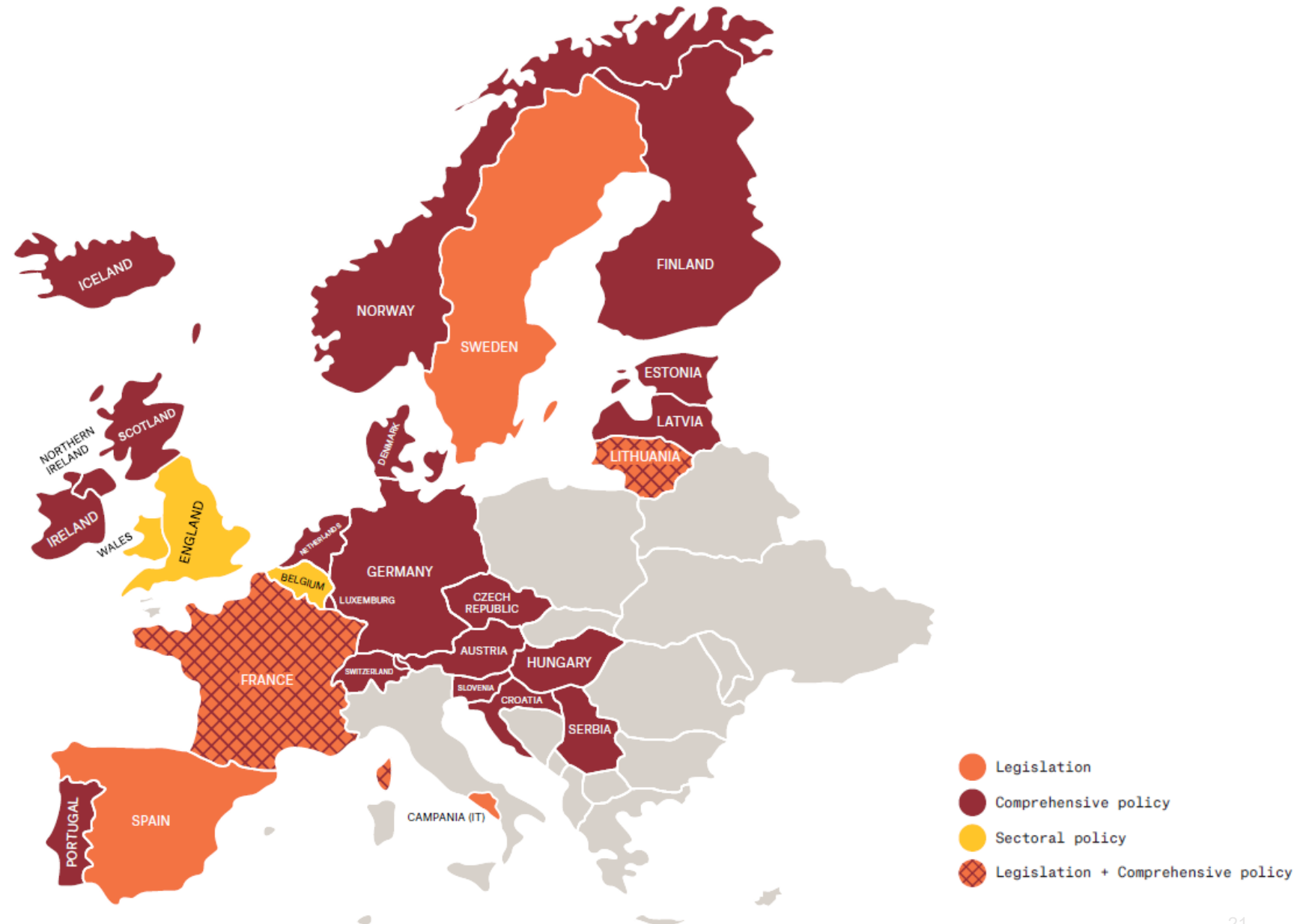

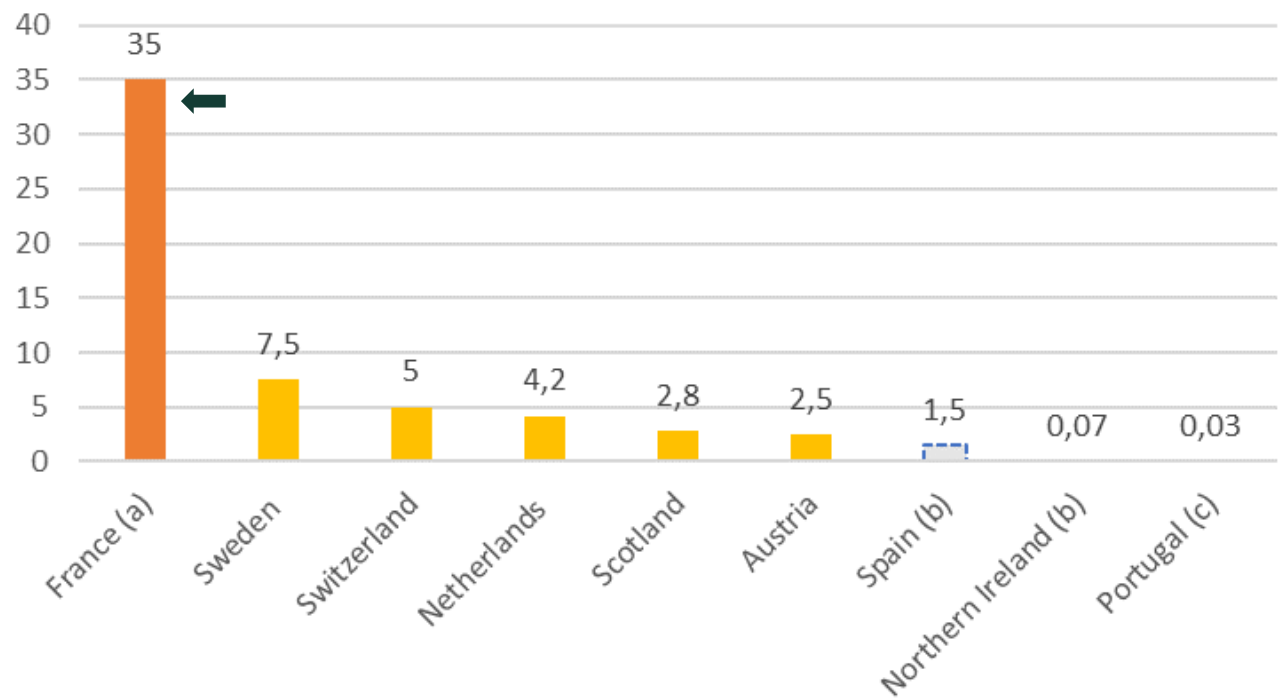

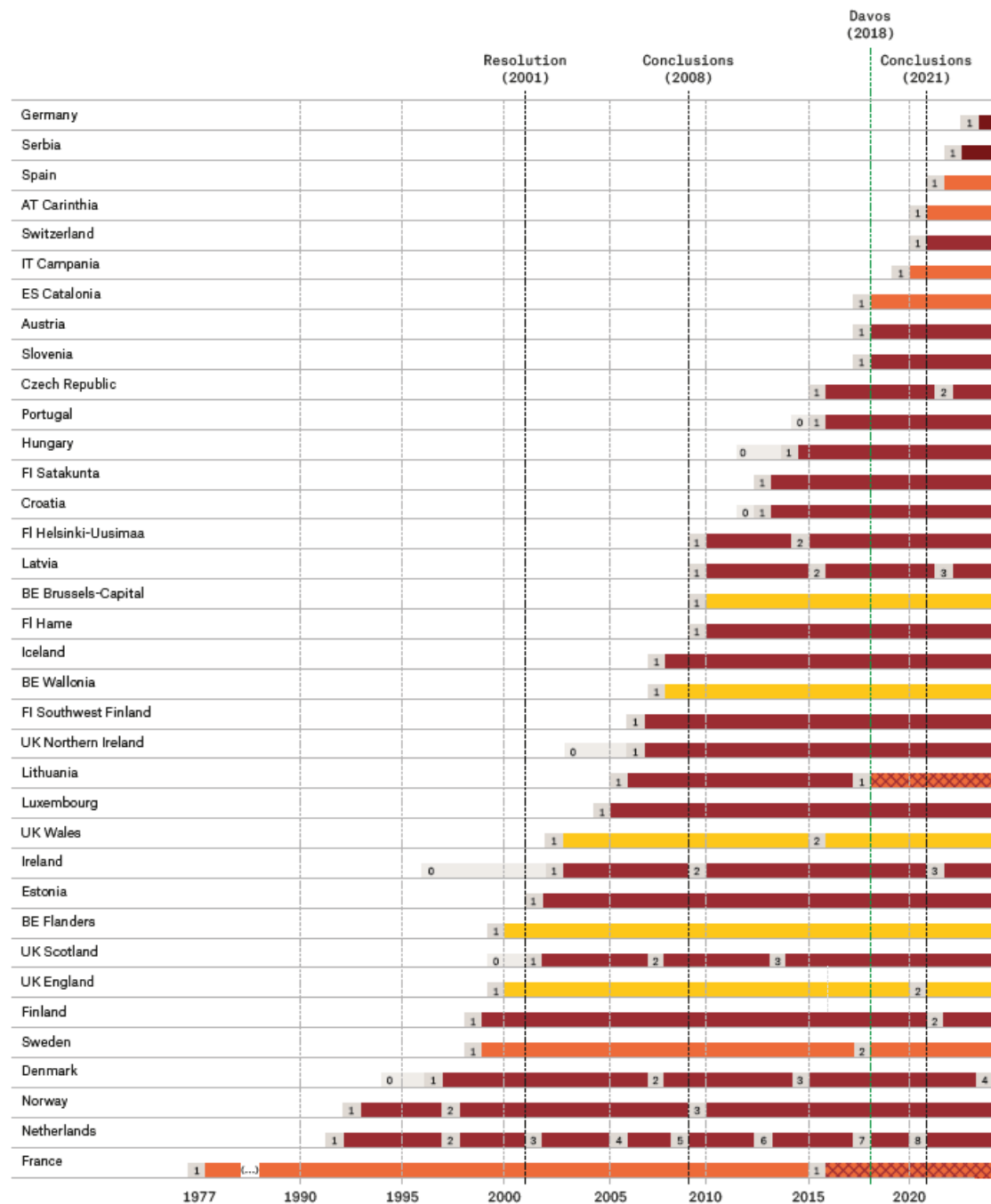

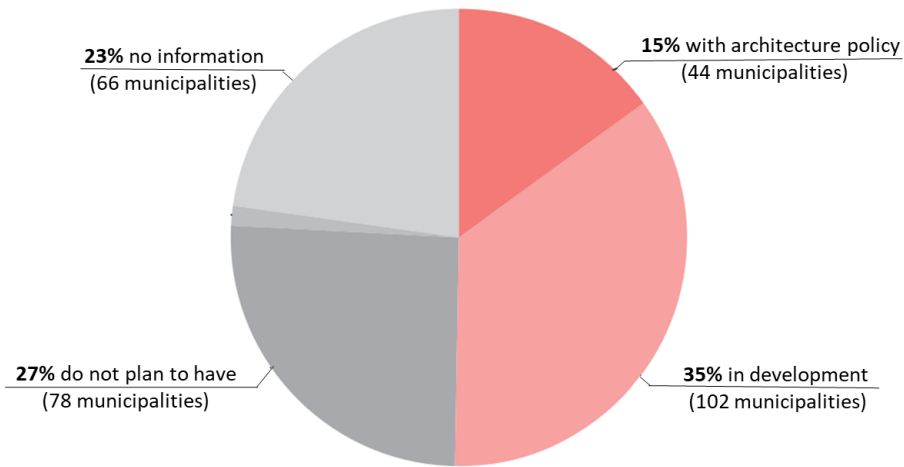
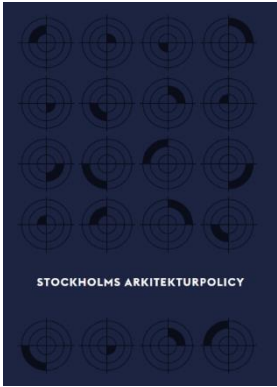
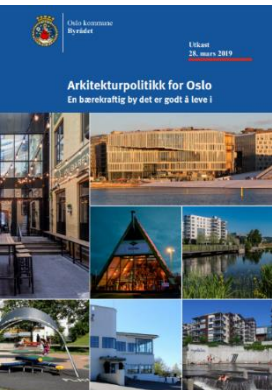
Architectural policy budget



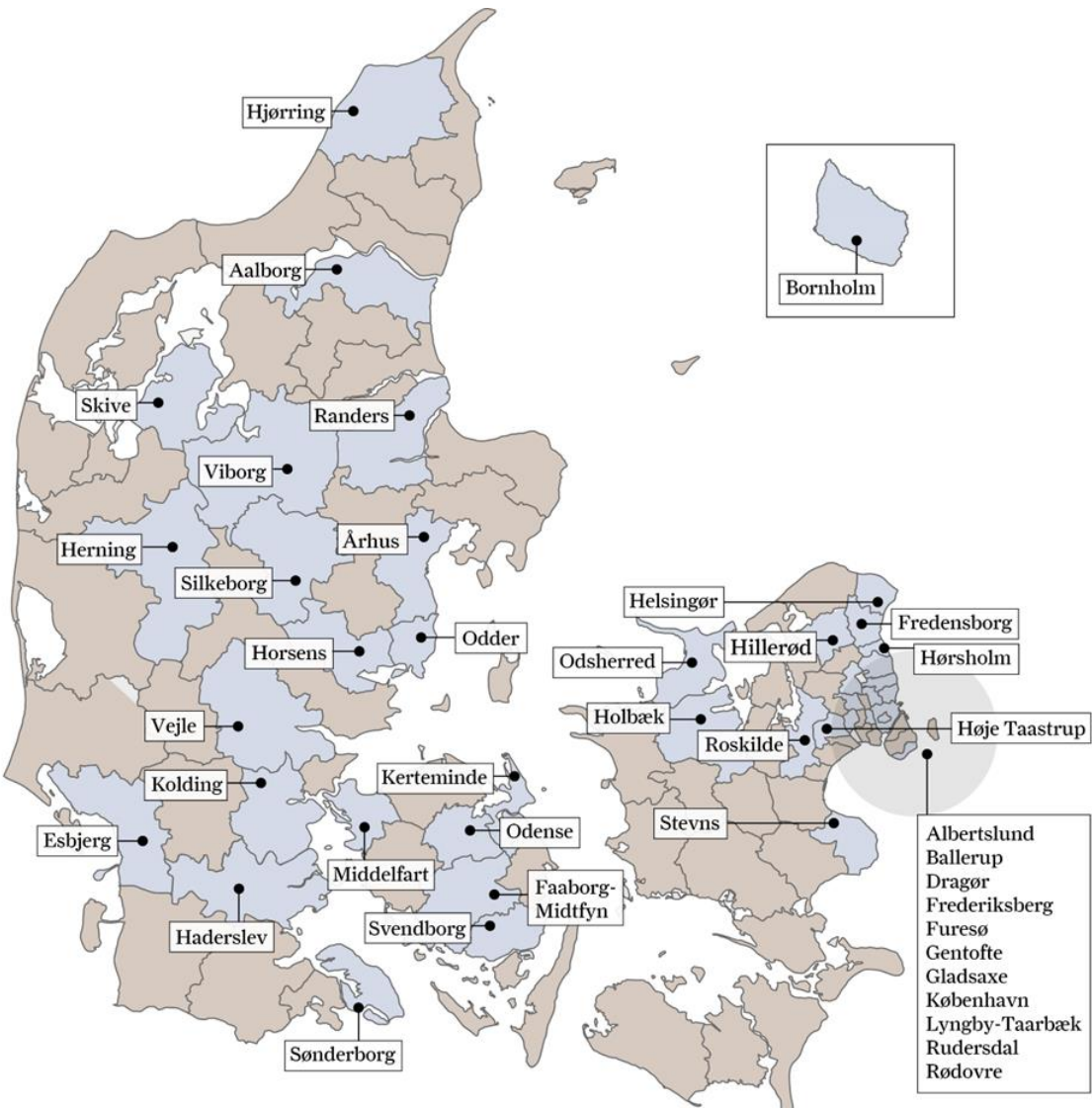
- a) Including architectural and cultural heritage policy.

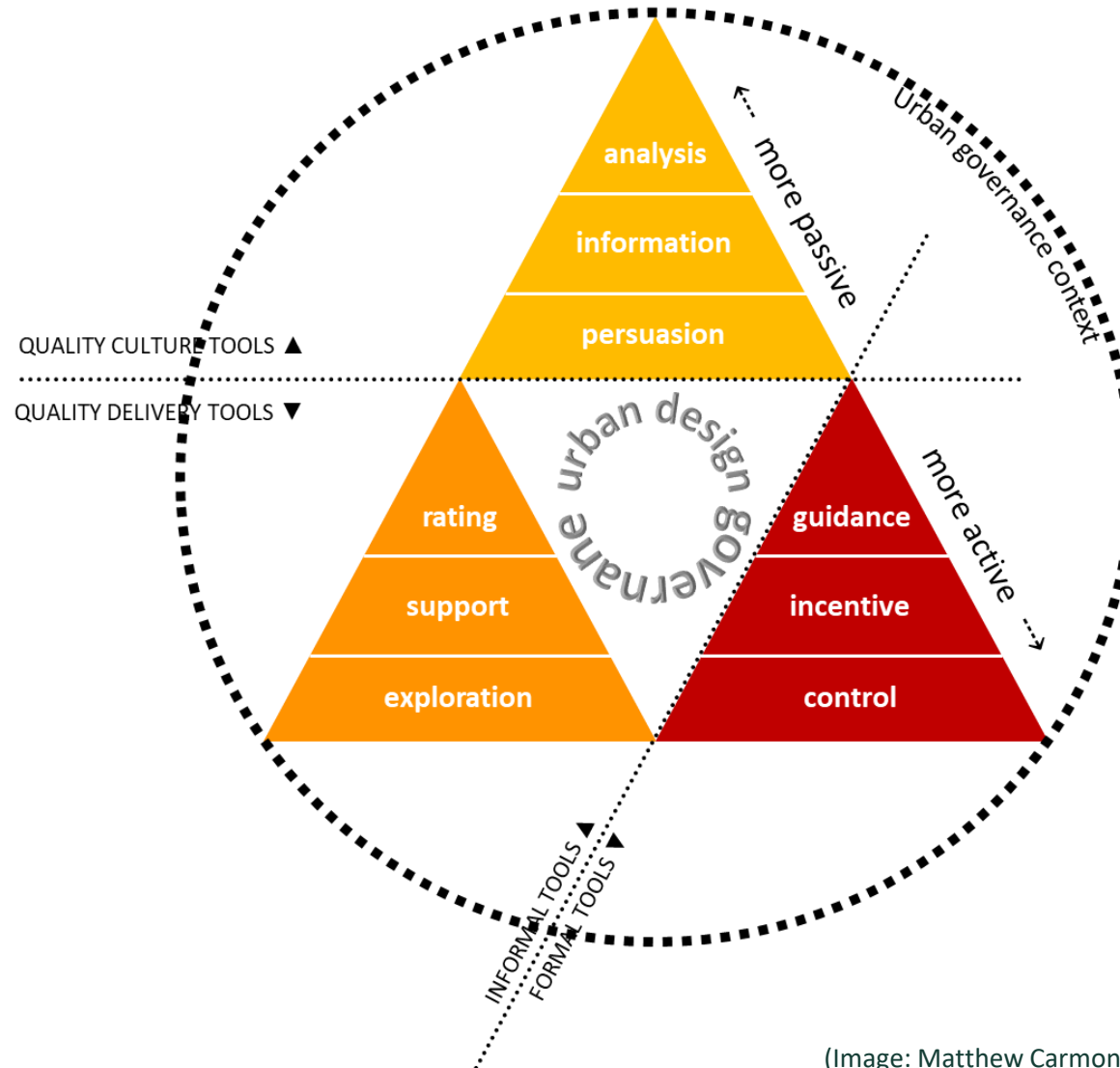


Specific initiatives and actions

What specific initiatives / actions have been undertaken in support of the policy and/or Council Resolution on architecture quality in urban and rural environments (2001/C 73/04) objectives in terms of:

- **Improving knowledge and promotion** of architecture, urban design, landscape and cultural heritage (e.g. publications, practice guides, cases studies, web portals)?
- **Promoting awareness among the general public** in appreciation of architectural, urban and landscape culture (e.g. exhibitions, events, festivals, financial support to cultural organizations, programmes grants)?
- **Promoting awareness and training among contracting authorities** (e.g. conferences, workshops, design support, specialized training)?
- **Fostering a culture of best practice in procurement** of architectural projects (e.g. awards, support for organizing design competitions, design advisory boards)?
- **Fostering exchange of information and experience** in the field of architecture and architectural procurement (e.g. advocacy, meetings, design awards, partnerships)?

European typology of urban design governance tools



1. **Analysis tools** – evidence about how and with what consequences the built environment is shaped.
2. **Information tools** – dissemination of knowledge about good (or poor) design practices and processes.
3. **Persuasion tools** – actively make the case for particular design responses in a proactive manner.
4. **Rating tools** – allow judgements about design quality to be made in a systematic and structured manner.
5. **Support tools** – directly assisting or enabling design / development teams with particular projects.
6. **Exploration tools** – hands-on design investigations and community engagement.
7. **Guidance tools** – formally set out operational design parameters to direct the design of development.
8. **Incentive tools** – direct and indirect economic stimulation by the state.
9. **Control tools** – development- and construction-related regulation and decision-making

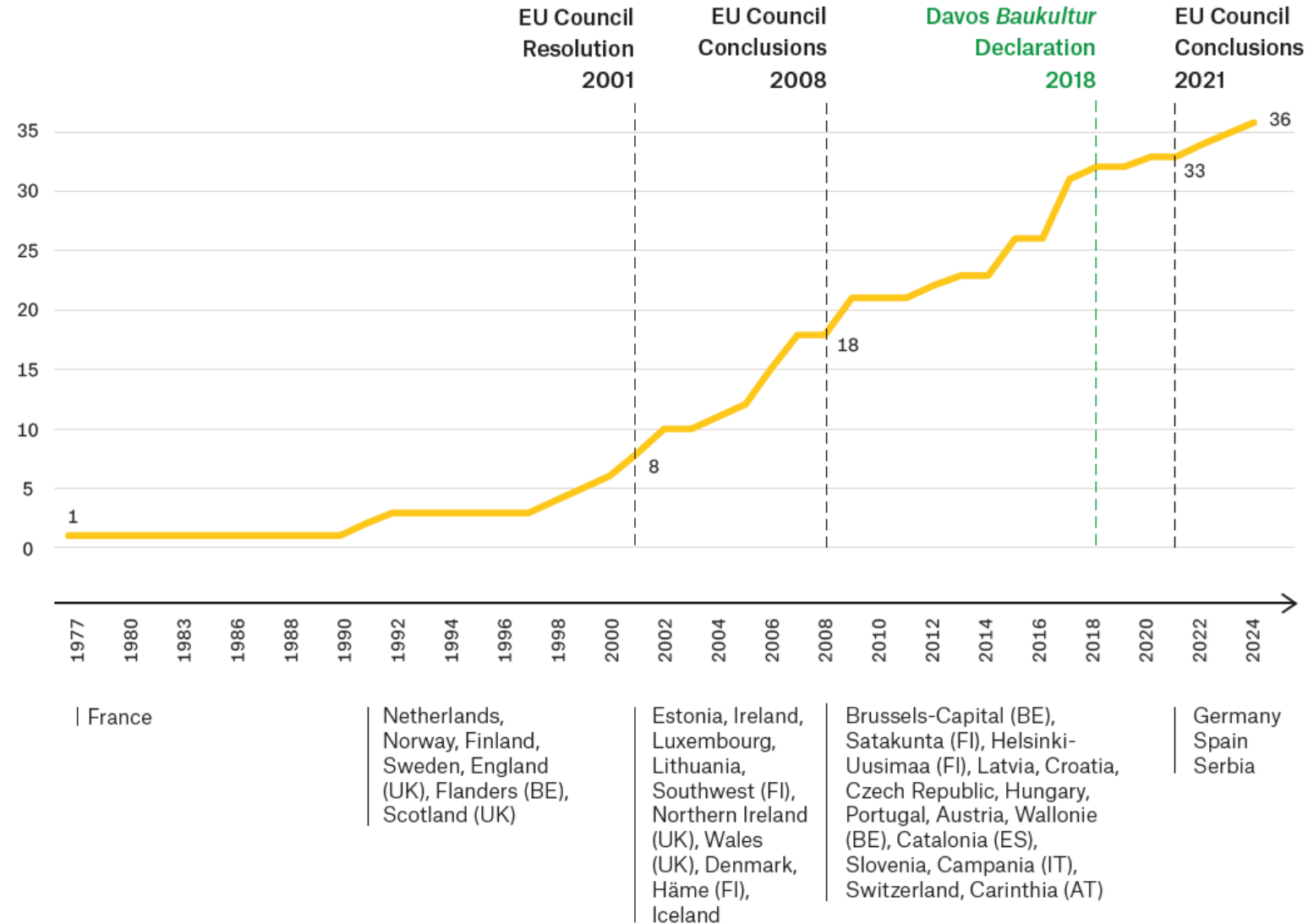

Study on architectural policies in Europe

Key insights:

The importance of **governmental leadership** for creating the conditions within which a high quality built environment can flourish

Architectural policies are having substantial impacts on design governance processes, namely **improving policy coordination, facilitating cross-sectoral collaboration** across and beyond public administrations, and **enabling a diversity of tools and initiatives** promoting best practices and fostering a placemaking culture

There is a need of better **policy integration**. Sectors keep having difficulties in leaving behind their own silos and making use of spatial visions

The **lack of funding** of most policies reduces/limits their impact extent in design governance processes

Difficulties in implementing initiatives and actions without appropriate level of resources
